

- Enroll in and complete our mandatory **online** immigration check-in course **as soon as possible upon arrival in the U.S**.
 - Instructions will be sent via email closer to the start of the term

Maintaining Your Immigration Status

- Maintain good academic standing and make progress towards degree program requirements
- Enroll full-time during academic year (Fall & Winter semesters)
 - Undergraduate = 12 credits per term
 - Must be enrolled in at least one in-person or hybrid course (3 credits) in Fall
- Maintain valid passport and I-20/DS-2019
- Maintain health insurance coverage
- Update your address in Wolverine Access within 10 days of any change
- Notify the International Center if you:
 - Withdraw from your program or intend to take some time off from your studies
 - Intend to transfer to another U.S. institution
 - Complete your program early

Employment in the United States:

On-campus:

- May work <u>on-campus</u> up to 20 hours each week during academic year.
 - On-campus work authorization for F-1 students is automatic.
 - J-1 students must apply in advance through the International Center.
- May work more than 20 hours each week during breaks/vacation period.

Off-campus:

- May not work off campus without proper work authorization such as <u>Curricular Practical</u> <u>Training (CPT)</u> for F-1 students or <u>Academic Training</u> for J-1 students.
 - All off-campus employment activities must be directly related to the major field of study
 - F-1 degree seeking students must be enrolled for one academic year (i.e. two full terms) before they are eligible for CPT, unless academic program requires immediate participation for all students in the program.

Traveling Outside of the USA:

When travelling internationally, you should carry with you:

- Valid I-20/DS-2019 with current travel signature
 - Valid for one year from signature date
 - Valid for multiple entries
- Valid passport (should be valid for an additional 6 months from entry)
- Valid visa (there may be an exception for Canada, Mexico, & adjacent Caribbean islands)

International Student Health Insurance Plan

- Automatically enrolled
 - Start date: I-20 or DS-2019 start date
 - $\circ~$ End date I-20 or DS-2019 end date
- F-1 and J-1 students are required to have approved insurance throughout their F-1/J-1 stay, including time not enrolled in classes
- Charges posted on Wolverine Access every month

Your Insurance Company and Card

- Your insurance company is Blue Care Network (BCN)
- After you complete your mandatory immigration check-in, look for an email from ship-enrollment@bluewaterbenefitsadmin.com
- Set up your member account and obtain your virtual insurance card.
- A BCN insurance card will come in the mail.

Coverage Highlights

- Routine/preventive care including immunizations
- Visits to specialists
- In-patient (hospital stay) and outpatient (visit doctor and return home the same day)
- Mental health
- Prescription drugs covered at 90%
 - Medicine not prescribed by doctor is not covered
- Limited dental and vision coverage
- Medical Evacuation, Repatriation and Travel Assistance

Dental and vision coverage

Dental

Routine exams, cleanings, emergency pain relief, fillings and wisdom tooth extraction for students age 19 and older.

Vision

•Two eye exams/year and one visit/year for contact lens fitting in-network or at UHS - \$20 co-pay. Eyeglasses or contacts are not covered

-More coverage for pediatric dental and vision for up to age 19 can be found in the BCN Member Guide

How Insurance Works

Insurance pays for most but not all costs of health care.

You may have to pay:

- ANNUAL DEDUCTIBLE (\$100) = what you must pay each policy year (September 1 – August 31) before insurance starts to cover costs
- CO-PAY: You pay a fixed amount, then insurance covers the rest.
 - Example: Office Visit/Walk-in Clinic/Urgent Care co-pay: \$20
- COINSURANCE: You pay a percentage of the cost (10% in network).

There are some exceptions. For example: no deductible, co-pay or coinsurance for immunizations, and some annual health exams when in-network

Using Your Insurance

- In an emergency, you can call 911 or go to the Emergency Room. Your insurance covers ambulance and emergency treatment
- If you need medical care, give the doctor/hospital your insurance information and pay co-pay if requested
- The doctor/hospital will bill BCN and they will pay their amount of the bill.
- If you owe money, you will receive a bill from the doctor/hospital

• If no waiver form is submitted or your request is denied, you will be required to keep & pay for International Health Insurance

Government Imposter Scam

Students at UM have received phone calls from the Chinese Embassy in Chicago stating there is an issue with their passport or VISA and they are under investigation. The "embassy" asks for pictures of ID, screenshots of bank account information, and money to help clear up the investigation. They have even asked students to open Skype accounts so they can monitor their actions.

This is a SCAM.

Scammers can **SPOOF** phone numbers from legitimate government agencies. Even if the number is legitimate, the person calling you **IS NOT**.

URBANA, III. (WCIA) — A University of Illinois student is out of \$90,000 after University Police said

they were scammed by someone on the phone.

Officials said that the student received a string of calls throughout November from someone claiming to be a representative of the Chinese Embassy. The caller told the student that their passport was connected to international crime and threatened the student with deportation. The student paid off the threat on Nov. 21 after two-and-a-half weeks' worth of calls.

This scam is the latest in a series throughout the year that targeted international students and involved the payment of five- or six-digit amounts of money. All of the scams involved someone claiming to be either authorities in China or Chinese diplomats in the U.S. and telling the victims they had been implicated in criminal activity that required a payment to resolve.

The IRS, Police, Courts, or other government agencies:

- Will NEVER call to demand immediate payment
- Will NEVER ask for a prepaid debit card, gift card, wire transfer, or Zelle transfer

HANG UP!! IT'S A SC

- Will NEVER request credit or debit card numbers over the phone
- Would NOT threaten to call local police, or another law enforcement agency, to arrest you for non-payment
- Additionally, the IRS will never call you about taxes without having first mailed a paper version of the bill

Spoofing can also involve fake advertisements for jobs, apartments, houses, or vacation rentals. Scammers ask for a security deposit and/or first month's rent.

- Ask to meet the landlord/lease holder in person or on a **live** video call.
- Scammers like to use Zelle, Venmo, gift cards, or wire transfers because it is hard to trace or recover your money once sent.
- Take your time. Scammers like to put the pressure on!




